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#### SECTION 1 – 2024 Cottage Crafts Creative Challenge (this section is judged by Cottage Crafts Committee)

Rocks must be a suitable size to be carried in one hand. Attention paid to: Creativity, technique and design.

Class 1Painted Rock – primary age students and under (please mark age on the bottom of the rock)Class 2Painted Rock – open to all ages

#### **SECTION 2 - Sewing**

Attention paid to: Seams, hems, fastenings, general finish, neatness and cleanliness. Machining: must be uniform. Well placed and functional zippers, plackets, overlaps in width, evenly stitched, neatened both ends. Buttonholes: evenly spaced, neat, durable and suitable to garment type. Necklines/armholes: seam allowance trimmed to 6mm/<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" overlocking and binding where necessary, fullness evenly distributed, grain correct. Finish of sleeves and hems, buttoning to the correct side. Degree of difficulty will be taken into account.

- Class 3 Apron (any style)
- Class 4 Bag, purse or wallet
- Class 5 Toy (in any fabric)
- Class 6 Dressed doll (clothes sewn)
- Class 7 Any other article of sewing not otherwise scheduled (in plain or stretch fabric, including all sewn items featuring hand embroidery and/or smocking)

#### SECTION 3 – Patchwork & Quilting

Attention paid to: Neatness and cleanliness, no loose threads, well pressed with good shape and proportion, inconspicuous joins. Threads should match fabric colour. Fabric should be similar and even weight. Grain of fabric should be running in the same direction. Degree of difficulty will be taken into account when being judged.

- Class 8 Quilt machine quilted (must state on the entry form if self-quilted OR professionally quilted)
- Class 9 Quilt hand guilted only
- Class 10 Wall hanging (any style)
- Class 11 Any other article of patchwork and/or quilting not otherwise scheduled

#### **SECTION 4 - Crochet**

Attention paid to: Appropriate yarn needs to be used to show stitch definition (E.g. not feather yarn). Hook size used is appropriate for yarn weight, with consistent tension. Neat joins/seams (not bulky). Ends are woven in well. Garment must be of good shape and proportion. Garments must not be washed, worn or used. Only one single item per entry (no sets).

- Class 12 Baby or infant garment (flat seams must be used, no open or lacy patterns, small flat buttons, no press studs, no ribbons)
- Class 13 Child or adult garment
- Class 14 Blanket or rug (any size)
- Class 15 Toy or amigurumi
- Class 16 Any other article of crochet not otherwise scheduled

#### **SECTION 5 – Hand Knitting**

Attention paid to: Appropriate yarn needs to be used to show stitch definition (E.g. not feather yarn). Needle size used is appropriate for yarn weight, with consistent tension. Neat joins/seams (not bulky). Elasticity in casting on/off. Ends are woven in well. Garment must be of good shape and proportion. Garments must not be washed, worn or used. No items made on knitting machines. Only one single item per entry (no sets).

- Class 17 Baby or infant garment (flat seams must be used, no open or lacy patterns, small flat buttons, no press studs, no ribbons)
- Class 18 Child or adult garment
- Class 19 Blanket or rug (any size)
- Class 20 Toy
- Class 21 Any other article of knitting not otherwise scheduled

#### SECTION 6 - Hand Embroidery

Attention paid to: Appearance must be neat and clean. Stitches are uniform with consistent tension. No knots or long threads carried from place to place. Pattern outline covered by stitches. Design placed on fabric evenly. Item may be framed or unframed.

- Class 22 Article of cross stitch
- Class 23 Any other article of hand embroidery not otherwise scheduled

#### SECTION 7 – Assorted Crafts (all must be a displayable size to fit on a shelf)

Attention paid to: Design, creativity, finish, and degree of difficulty.

Class 24	Tea Cosy (in knitting, crochet, or sewn)
	<ul> <li>Does not need to be lined. Must be displayed on own teapot.</li> </ul>
Class 25	Any article in macrame
	<ul> <li>Attention paid to: Neatness and finishing. Knots should be firm and evenly placed.</li> </ul>
Class 26	Hand spun skein (medium spun, natural or dyed)
	<ul> <li>Attention paid to: Appearance, colour and technique. Evenness of twist, fibre, and ply throughout. Free from discoloration and vegetable matter.</li> </ul>
Class 27	Any drawing or painting
	<ul> <li>No larger than A3 size. Any medium. May be framed or unframed.</li> </ul>
Class 28	Any article in woodwork
	<ul> <li>Attention paid to: Sound construction. Well-proportioned article. Joints neat and correct. Article suitable for intended use E.g. toys have no sharp edges. Moving parts should move freely.</li> </ul>
Class 29	Any article in metal work
	• Attention paid to: Sound construction. Well-proportioned article. Joints neat and correct. Article suitable for intended use E.g. toys have no sharp edges. Moving parts should move freely.
Class 30	Any resin poured item
	<ul> <li>Attention paid to: Style, design, creativity, and finish.</li> </ul>
Class 31	Any other article of craftwork not otherwise scheduled
	Must be a displayable size that can sit on a shelf. Please consider practicality of display.

#### SECTION 8 - Economy Craft - something new from something used

Attention paid to: At least 90% recycled and 10% new. Any technique can be used to create your entry. The recycled item(s) must be identified on the exhibit ticket.

- Class 32 Article made from recycled textiles (sewing, knitting, macrame etc.)
- Class 33 Article made from recycled wood
- Class 34 Article made from recycled metal
- Class 35 Article made from recycled plastic

#### **SECTION 9 – 3D Printing**

Attention paid to: FDM prints should be clean without visible print artefacts such as stringing, z-seam, bumps, ringing/ghosting. Clean bridging (no large under hangs), and no under extrusion resulting in gaps in the outer walls

or top layers. Resin prints should have clean details that "pop". Print orientation should reduce the layer stepping effect. Straight surfaces should be flat and edges/corners should be sharp, without warping or peeling. Joined pieces should be seamless without visible gaps or glue residue. Prints may be painted or unpainted (but judging is based on the print quality, not the painting).

Attention paid to: Creativity, design, technique, and degree of difficulty. Only one single card per entry (no sets).

- Class 40 Scrapbooking page (must be displayed in a clear plastic sleeve)
- Class 41 Card Christmas (must fit into a C6 envelope)
- Class 42 Card birthday (must fit into a C6 envelope)
- Class 43 Card other (must fit into a C6 envelope)
- Class 44 Card featuring punch or die cut designs (any size)
- Class 45 Card dimensional / funfold (any size)
- Class 46 Any other article in paper craft not otherwise scheduled

#### SECTION 11 - Senior Citizens (65 years and over)

- Class 47 Any article in knitting or crochet (please refer to tips in section 4)
- Class 48 Any handmade card (any size) (please refer to tips in section 10)
- Class 49 Any article in sewing (please refer to tips in section 2)
- Class 50 Any article in craftwork not other otherwise scheduled (must be a displayable size that can sit on a shelf. Please consider practicality of display).

#### SECTION 12 – Exhibitors with Additional Needs

- Class 51 Any article in paper craft, including cards (any size) (please refer to tips in section 10)
- Class 52 Any article in craftwork (must be a displayable size that can sit on a shelf. Please consider practicality of display).

#### **SECTION 13 – Photography**

Attention paid to: Photographs to be no larger than 6" x 8" (15 x 20cm) and must be printed on photo paper. All photographs must be mounted on A4 black card (but not framed) and be mounted with double sided tape (no glue or Blu-Tack to be used). The black card may be stapled to a display board for exhibition purposes and therefore the card will be damaged. No digital enhancements permitted (editing, filters, A.I. etc).

#### SECTION 14 - Cooking

All cooking must be presented on a disposable white plate of appropriate size. Cooking must be at least 12 hours old. No packet or cake mixes allowed. Attention paid to: Biscuits/slices/scones should be uniform in size and shape. Icing should be smooth. Items cooked all the way through (judges will sample from the centre of the cake).

\*Exhibit tickets will be attached to the plate at time of delivery.

- Class 63 Decorated cake (round or square tin)
- Class 64 Fruit or date loaf
- Class 65 Muffins (4) any variety
- Class 66 Shortbread (4)
- Class 67 Chocolate chip biscuits (4)
- Class 68 ANZAC biscuits (4)
- Class 69 Slice (4 pieces) any variety
- Class 70 Scones plain (4) no sugar added
- Class 71 Scones sweet (4) E.g. sugar added or fruit
- Class 72 Scones savoury (4) E.g. cheese
- Class 73 Simplicity chocolate cake (must use recipe below)
- Class 74 Vegetable cake icing allowed (Cake recipe must be attached. Not to be a mixed fruit cake.)
- Class 75 Light fruit cake
- Class 76 Rich fruit cake (\$20 prize kindly donated by Hillcrest Newsagency)

Simplicity Chocolate Cake Recipe – Class 73:

<u>Ingredients:</u> 3 tablespoons butter, ½ cup milk, 1 cup self-raising flour, 2 tablespoons cocoa, ½ teaspoon vanilla essence, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs.

<u>Method:</u> Place all ingredients, except the butter, into a bowl. Pour in melted butter and beat with electric beater on high for 3 minutes. Pour mixture into a prepared round tin and bake at 180°C until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean (approximately 50mins). Ice with chocolate glace icing.

<u>Chocolate Glace Icing</u>: 1 cup icing sugar, 2 tablespoons cocoa, 1 teaspoon soft butter, 1 tablespoon milk. Sift sugar and cocoa. Add butter and milk. Beat well.

#### SECTION 15 - Preserves

Attention paid to: Jars should be clean and neatly labelled with the type of product and date when cooked. Jars should be fully sealed, filled to the top will no more than 5mm headspace. Jam should be well set but not stiff and look freshly made. Colour should be bright and flavour should be typical of fruit used, with fruit evenly distributed. Jelly should be clear and hold its shape when turned out. Relish vegetable/fruit pieces should retain shape and colour with consistency neither too thick, nor too thin. Sauce should be smooth in texture with a flowing consistency, not watery or separating out.

Attention paid to: Artwork can be painting or drawing, any medium, no larger than A3 size, can be mounted on coloured card. Craftwork must be a displayable size that can sit on a shelf (please consider practicality of display).

Class 89	Year 3-6 - Artwork
Class 90	Year 2 and under - Artwork
Class 91	Year 7-12 – Any article of craftwork

#### SECTION 18 – Junior Photography

Attention paid to: Photographs to be no larger than 6" x 8" (15 x 20cm) and must be printed on photo paper. All photographs must be mounted on A4 black card (but not framed) and be mounted with double sided tape (no glue or Blu-Tack to be used). The black card may be stapled to a display board for exhibition purposes and therefore the card will be damaged. No digital enhancements permitted (editing, filters, A.I. etc).
